# SNOHOMISH COUNTY COUNTS KEY COMMUNITY ASSETS

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Key Community Assets Project was a new addition to the assessment process in Snohomish County. In past assessments, the total focus was on completing a needs assessment. In the current Snohomish County Counts community assessment we wanted to add an asset portion to the assessment. Many communities have begun adding an asset mapping proponent to their community assessments in recognition that one's local assets are essential ingredients to improving the health and well-being of a community. This awareness has been growing over the past five years, mainly through the work of the Asset-Based Community Development Institute at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, whose work is based upon the research of John Kretzmann and John McKnight and their landmark 1993 book Building Communities from the Inside Out: A Path Toward Finding and Mobilizing a Community's Assets (1993, ACTA Publications, Chicago). The following is an excerpt from the introduction of their book:

### **The Assets of a Community: Individuals, Associations, Institutions**

Each community boasts a unique combination of assets upon which to build its future. A thorough map of those assets would begin with an inventory of the gifts, skills and capacities of the community's residents. Household by household, building by building, block by block, the capacity mapmakers will discover a vast and often surprising array of individual talents and productive skills, few of which are being mobilized for community-building purposes. This basic truth about the "giftedness" of every individual is particularly important to apply to persons who often find themselves marginalized by communities. It is essential to recognize the capacities, for example, of those who have been labeled mentally handicapped or disabled, or of those who are marginalized because they are too old, or too young, or too poor. In a community whose assets are being fully recognized and mobilized, these people too will be part of the action, not as clients or recipients of aid, but as full contributors to the community-building process.

In addition to mapping the gifts and skills of individuals, and of households and families, the committed community builder will compile an inventory of citizens' associations. These associations, less formal and much less dependent upon paid staff than are formal institutions, are the vehicles through which citizens in the U.S. assemble to solve problems, or to share common interests and activities. It is usually the case that the depth and extent of associational life in any community is vastly underestimated. This is particularly true of lower income communities. In fact, however, though some parts of associational life may have dwindled in very low income neighborhoods, most communities continue to harbor significant numbers of associations with religious, cultural, athletic, recreational and other purposes. Community builders soon recognize that these groups are indispensable tools for development, and that many of them can in fact be stretched beyond their original purposes and intentions to become full contributors to the development process.

Beyond the individuals and local associations that make up the asset base of communities are all of the more formal institutions which are located in the community. Private businesses; public institutions such as schools, libraries, parks, police and fire stations; nonprofit institutions such as hospitals and social service agencies--these organizations make up the most visible and formal

part of a community's fabric. Accounting for them in full, and enlisting them in the process of community development, is essential to the success of the process. For community builders, the process of mapping the institutional assets of the community will often be much simpler than that of making an inventory involving individuals and associations. But establishing within each institution a sense of responsibility for the health of the local community, along with mechanisms that allow communities to influence and even control some aspects of the institution's relationships with its local neighborhood, can prove much more difficult. Nevertheless, a community that has located and mobilized its entire base of assets will clearly feature heavily involved and invested local institutions. Individuals, associations and institutions--these three major categories contain within them much of the asset base of every community.

While the Key Community Assets Work Group for Snohomish County Counts was not able to do an asset mapping at the individual or neighborhood level, we did focus on creating a beginning database of local associations, businesses, labor groups, and service providers. Our first work group meeting was in January 25, 2001 at United Way of Snohomish County. Our goal was to find out and catalog information about community assets in the form of existing groups and services. To achieve this goal, we undertook two tasks: (1) Conduct information-gathering surveys of local associations, business and labor, and service providers, and (2) Create a database of these asset-building associations and organizations. The members of the work group are listed on the prior acknowledgement page.

Our work group met on a monthly basis during the first six months of the project. During this time, work group members identified and compiled data from many different resources that listed local Snohomish County association, business, labor, and service provider assets, and their contact information. The Community Information Line at Volunteers of America provided a rich resource of data, as did local Chambers of Commerce, church organizations, labor groups, military organizations, the Everett Neighborhood Associations, other specific segments of the community that have been gathering information in their particular sector.

While identifying and compiling these local community assets, the work group also prepared four inventory surveys to be mailed to these assets, one survey for each of the asset areas; association, labor, business, and service providers. The group used inventories prepared nationally by Compass 2.0, a community assessment guide created by United Way of America. A copy of each of the inventories is attached to this report.

The completion of the data gathering activity and the creation of the four inventories brought an end to the duties of the full work group. Volunteers of America and United Way of Snohomish County, under the direction of Bill Brackin and Dennis Smith both provided staff time for the data entry and analysis part of the project.

First, all of the identified local assets were placed into a Microsoft Access database. The number of individual asset organizations identified and entered were 68 local labor organizations, 444 associations, 1,026 businesses, and 1,140 service providers, for a total of 2,678 identified local Snohomish County assets!

Next, the inventory surveys were mailed to all of the identified asset organizations in November 2001. Each organization received an inventory that matched their particular category. 214 inventories (a 8% return) were returned and their information was added to the database. There

was 1 inventory returned by a labor union (SPEEA/IFPTE 2001), 40 inventories returned by local associations, 50 inventories returned by businesses, and 123 returned by service providers. It is our hope that as community members begin to use this database that other local asset organizations will want to add their data, and thus helping to enlarge the amount of information available.

Reports have been developed from this asset database. Attached to this executive summary are (1) contact summaries of Service Providers that Responded to Our Survey, Associations that Responded to Our Survey, and Business that Responded to Our Survey, (2) Key Community Assets Community Involvement Reports for Associations, Businesses, and Service Providers, and (3) a summary of Types of Services Provided by Service Providers in 2000.

Having created this Snohomish County Community Assets database, the *Snohomish County Counts* partners will attempt to find ways in which to make this database available to the public. We are currently exploring methods by which we could make it accessible over the Internet. It will be especially helpful if we are able to create a process by which organizations whose data is not on the list or currently incomplete can go on-line in order to add their information.
